

Mangroves. Mangroves are a specialised group of salt-tolerant, terrestrial plants that inhabit shorelines between low and high tide levels. Along the mainland and islands of the Dampier Archipelago there are six species of mangrove. The most abundant species growing in the region is the Grey Mangrove (*Avicennia marina*). Mangroves do not belong to a single taxonomic group, rather it is the name given to a group of plants that are all adapted to live in the intertidal zone (between the average sea level and the high tide mark). Mangroves occur naturally in most coastal areas of Western Australia from Shark Bay northwards.
